Mr. Brandgard: Thank you for being here this evening. The Plainfield Town Council meeting for June 26, 2023, is now in session.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mr. Brandgard: I'd like to ask everyone to rise for the Pledge of Allegiance.

ROLL CALL TO DETERMINE QUORUM

Mr. Brandgard: Let the record show that all members are present except for Bill Kirchoff. We do have a quorum for conducting business.

COMMUNITY VALUES AWARD

Mr. Brandgard: Tonight, we are going to award the Community Values Award for justice. If Rob Pritchard and Jacko could come forward. The community value of the month of June is justice. Justice is defined as acting honorably and fairly in accordance with recognized law, respecting authority, not stealing, respecting the national flag, the constitution of the United States, and the constitution of the state of Indiana. While we could recognize just about anyone within the Plainfield Police Department, there is a special officer who goes beyond his role as an officer to make other's lives better, in particular the lives of dogs and young kids. Plainfield Police Officer Rob Pritchard and his K-9 Officer Jacko have made it their mission to create once in a lifetime experiences when others are fighting the life of illnesses, through the department's partnership with the Make-A-Wish Foundation. Officer Pritchard and Jacko have planned and helped make several wishes over the last few years, which is noble in itself. Recently Rob partnered with other police officers to bring Public Safety Day to a young girl who was on hospice, but he did not stop there. He also coordinated several agencies to do a drive-by for the young girl on her birthday. Rob Pritchard has also taken it upon himself to undergo training to turn Hendricks County Humane Society shelter dogs into K-9 officers. This program will bring justice for those dogs who may not have been rescued from the shelter. Recently, Officer Pritchard brought justice for another dog who was near death from neglect from his owner. Rob helped raise money for the dog's care and sat with him in the emergency room following his shift. Thank you, Rob, for your noble and extraordinary acts which certainly go above and beyond your job. These acts continue to bring smiles to the faces of others across the community and has brought positive media coverage to our department, ultimately humanizing our police department as a whole.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

Mr. Brandgard: We do have two public hearings this evening. Do we have proof of publication?

Mr. Daniel: Yes, we do.

Mr. Brandgard: Thank you. First public hearing is for Annexation – Phase II / west half of lot at 6487 South County Road 600 East. Anybody in the audience that wishes to address us relative to this annexation?

(Brief pause)

Mr. Brandgard: Again, we have a public hearing for annexation.

(Brief pause)

Mr. Brandgard: With nobody coming forward we'll close that public hearing. Second public hearing is for Additional Appropriation for Water Operating, Wastewater Operating, Wastewater Availability, Storm Water Operating, and Storm Water Availability. Steve, if you would...?

Mr. Dyson: Just a quick little update on the additional appropriation request. The first item is the Water Operating Fund. This is for a study and design of multiple water projects that could possibly be combined into a 2024 Water Bond. The study and design will help with the cost estimates and the project scope. The next four are all for the same project; Wastewater Operating and Wastewater Availability, Storm Water Operating and Storm Water Availability. This is for the downtown sewer and storm project in and around the Government Center and Arts Center. This is part of the Government Center and Arts Center overall project cost. These were not part of the bond; these were part of the cash contributions from utilities. We believe that this appropriation will complete the projects of the utility and (inaudible) in the downtown in and around the Government and Arts Center.

Mr. Brandgard: With nobody coming forward we'll close that public hearing.

BUSINESS FROM THE FLOOR

Mr. Brandgard: We'll go to business from the floor. I believe we have Kent Dickerson with us this evening, to discuss ADA compliance.

Mr. Klinger: So, I have a written statement from Mr. Dickerson that I would like to read into the record. And then I'll kind of turn it over to him. I think we have copies – oh, you already have your copies, alright. So, I will just read this in for the record:

Town Council,

My name is Kent Dickerson and I've been confined to this chair for last 7 years and with Gods blessings hopefully another 15-20 years. I don't let the disease get me down, I put close to 400-700 miles on my chair yearly. I love the town of Plainfield for their vision going forward, but for YEARS now, no one has addressed maintenance to Plainfield's vision. We have beautiful parks and trails, added every year. It's long past time that these parks trails or public sidewalks get brought up to ADA and local code standards, not just for the handicapped but the normal citizen, they are extremely dangerous! To say the least! I'm not at all trying to draw attention to me, it's for all the other handicapped people living behind me that this town is up to ADA and code compliant standards. While I admit, if I didn't have this devastating disease for 13 years, you're right, I would probably never notice these things. If one of your family members or friends would be in a powerchair I will guarantee you, the Town Council would have taken notice. The reason I'm here is because while the town has told me there would be money in the budget for 2024 to repair or replace these problems, why did it take me after driving over all these obstacles the last 9 years to bring it to their attention. Sounds like to me someone at Plainfield is not doing their job. I'm talking hundreds upon hundreds of code violations. I

will be happy to do this job for free if Town is not going to access these violations twice a year, on main streets. Okay, I think you get what I'm frustrated with. Asphalt starts to deteriorate within 5 years and lasts up to 20 years with yearly maintenance. Down Saratoga that path is well over the end of its life, just one instance in town. Can you tell me who's doing asphalt trail, north side of U.S. 40 on east end of town. I know it's Calumet doing work, but I want to know if state or town subbed the work, at end of path east of Ronald Reagan they installed nice, beautiful path but left manhole cover 3" down from grade, right in middle of path. Also, the path being put along west side of Perry Road north of U.S. 40, please make sure all manhole lids are level with path. It does not take much work to move manhole lids up or down, you just have to remove castings, take bricks or rings out to lower them and do opposite to raise them. At new town center, Plainfield sidewalk should not be closed without temporary sidewalk. At Main Street and Center Street on NE corner, light poles and every other kind of obstacles infringes on ADA widths. I'm very concerned also about all the new construction in town for last 10 years not meeting ADA codes. Sidewalk running grades, Sidewalk cross slope, Parking spaces, Etc.

Next you will find 15 pictures with letters shown for following code violations in attachments in back.

So, you should all have the actual pictures and then the code citations in there as well.

I look forward to working with Town of Plainfield on starting to get Town brought up to code. I'm happy to help in any way I can be of assistance. I look forward to seeing money to start these repairs in 2024 budget and hopefully the ones that are very dangerous this year. I don't expect band-aids for repairs either. I hope the Town understands my concerns and it continues to be a line item in yearly budget from 2024 on. If you see me driving down streets except U.S. 40 that's because I feel my odd are less getting ran over by car, than the unknown of sidewalk that I can't see and flip my chair on top of me it into road.

Mr. Dickerson: It's basically pictures of a few major violations.

Mr. Klinger: Yeah, if you look through the packet there's fifteen pictures. And in here, he has it coded with letters, indicating what the different violations are.

Mr. Dickerson: (inaudible)

Mr. Klinger: Yeah, and the code cites have letters, so you know which ones relate to which.

Mr. Dickerson: (inaudible)

Mr. Klinger: You know, I think – I would guess on that one, when it was first constructed, it probably was a flat surface, but the pavement has fallen and...

Mr. Dickerson: (inaudible)

Mr. Klinger: Well, I think the pavement has fallen but the manhole didn't move, so now it created that difference.

Mr. Dickerson: (inaudible)

Mr. Klinger: Yeah. Well, regardless of how it came about it's a violation (inaudible), yeah.

Mr. Dickerson: (inaudible)

Mr. Brandgard: First of all, I want to thank you for coming in this evening and for bringing this to our attention. We had a gentleman who worked for us who was taking care of these ADA issues, and when he left, he failed to assign that function to look over this to anybody else. And I can assure you we will fix those. We can't fix them all at once, but we will work at getting them corrected. I for one would like to ask if you will keep working with us and letting us know where these are at, so we can come up with a plan to correct them.

Mr. Dickerson: (inaudible)

Mr. Angle: (microphone not on) (inaudible) I'm very glad you wrote this up the way you did, brought it to us. And it is embarrassing but (inaudible) nobody wants to see anybody get hurt. Staff will work hard to make sure (inaudible).

Mr. Dickerson: (inaudible)

Mr. Brandgard: That project on the east side is a Plainfield project but it's not complete yet.

Mr. Dickerson: (inaudible)

Mr. Brandgard: Right. The process is, they put pavement down and after they put pavement down, they go back and raise the manholes up to the level of the street. They don't put the manhole in and pave up to that level. It's just like when we do the streets, we pave streets the same way. the manhole will be below and then we come back and bring it up.

Mr. Dickerson: (inaudible)

Mr. Brandgard: Yeah

Mr. Klinger: The expectation is that it would be compliant. So, that's where we can have a conversation with the vendor to make sure that they do – but like Robin said, it's not complete yet. (inaudible)

Mr. Brandgard: But if they do have that, we should have some protection around it.

Mr. Dickerson: (inaudible)

Mr. Brandgard: Is that number 13?

Mr. Dickerson: (inaudible)

Mr. Brandgard: Okay

Mr. Dickerson: (inaudible)

Mr. Brandgard: Okay. As I said, I certainly appreciate you bringing this in, and we'll work as best we can to get it corrected. Again, there's some places that we have done, and the state has had contractors in and doing it in other places. But we'll make every attempt to get it done and as he said, we are going to put money into next year's budget, start the process, and hopefully on the major issues we might have money to fix some of them. Thank you.

Mr. Klinger: I will just say that we do have an annual amount that we budget for these types of improvements. I think when we updated the transition plan a little over a year ago, it became clear the amount we've been allocating is not meeting the need. And so, as Robin said, at the staff level we've been having conversations about one, increasing the amount of annual budget we would put into making these sorts of improvements. But also, pulling from reserves to make a significant investment in trying to fix many of these types of issues as we can in the next year. But that's not going to be enough either; we're going to have to keep looking at it over a sustained period of time.

Mr. Bridget: I'd like to say to Mr. Dickerson that your presentation was very effective, and I understand this at a level I didn't understand it before. Thank you.

Mr. Brandgard: Is there any other business from the floor?

TOWN MANAGER AND STAFF REPORTS

Mr. Klinger: Yeah, I don't believe that there are any staff reports this evening. I will just note that next week is Independence Day on Tuesday, Fourth of July. So, town offices will be closed on that day, and we will be having the annual celebration that we do. We're in partnership with the township at Hummel Park. Our parks department also is going to – I believe – have some activities at the Al and Jan Barker Sports Complex as well, as we see more and more people coming to that location to watch the fireworks. So, it should be a good time. Hopefully we have some good weather. That's all I have.

Mr. Brandgard: Thank you. Might mention the town Government Center will be open on Monday; the holiday is on Tuesday.

Mr. Klinger: Yeah, and we do have a lot of people who are taking that Monday off. So, depending on who you're looking for, they may not be there that day. But yeah, the offices will be open on Monday, closed on Tuesday.

OLD BUSINESS

Mr. Brandgard: Kent, any old business?

Mr. McPhail: Unfortunately, yes. And I really hesitate to bring it up again, but Waste Management has not met their commitments. I know that we've had staff and council members meeting with them, but at least in my neighborhood they have not made any improvements. They sent a message out this week, or last week, that they would pick up all the old containers. They didn't pick any up in my neighborhood. Now we've got a notice sending out where the residents are going to have to take their old one someplace because they're not going to pick them up. Is that right? They missed streets in my subdivision. I talked to Al a couple of times. Pick up day is Tuesday in my neighborhood. Friday afternoon I finally tried myself to get a hold of somebody at Waste Management, but have you tried that? It is totally almost impossible. I was 20 minutes on the phone just trying to get somebody to talk to. They have a system, but you have a customer number or an address – well, everything in Plainfield is 206 West Main Street. If you give them that number, then they respond. I finally got a hold of a gentleman who told me – and this is exactly what he told me – he said I normally take these calls for other parts of the country, but

they brought me in to help because there are so many complaints since they bought Ray's Trash. They're dumping stuff in the streets; they're not getting it in the truck. Not one time has either one of my containers been set up straight; both of them have been thrown on the ground. Well, I take that back – once. There was a lady that come through with one of the trucks that dumps straight into the top. I stopped her and said, "Where's the best place to sit these because you're having trouble." But I followed her one day in another neighborhood and she was really good. But they've got a truck that comes in my neighborhood that they dump it in the front of the truck – a big old white rental truck of some kind – and then they dump it and when they take that and dump it, they dump it in the street and just keep driving on. So, I have gotten more complaints the last three months than I've had in the last 25 years from citizens, and it's all Waste Management. And I just have to go on record. I know you're tired of hearing it, but I have to tell you, it's not gotten any better in my neighborhood. Thank you.

Mr. Brandgard: Thank you.

Mr. Klinger: I don't think there's anything to say towards that because it's all true, but I will say that we did have a conversation with higher ups at WM; they've made again, some commitments to us. They haven't been particularly great at meeting commitments in the past, so I would take it for what it's worth. But just in terms of the customer service thing, their goal is to have, as I understand it, individual accounts for all residents sometime in the next few weeks. Al is on vacation; he would know more of the details, but they are trying. Because you're right, one of the biggest issues is you just can't get a hold of someone when you have a customer service issue. And so, my understanding is that they are working with their customer service system to be able to deliver – each resident would be able to sign up for an account instead of everything being under one town account. Which then should enable them to be able to utilize the online services when they have service delivery issues. So, I think that could be a big step if they can get that incorporated, but we haven't seen it yet.

Mr. McPhail: Well, the gentleman that I talked to, I told him I was a town councilman, told him right up front, and I said we've got a problem in Plainfield. When I got through with my speech, he said we have a system and I'm emailing right now, and I guarantee you'll get a call back from either a district manager or a route manager. I have not received that. So, even when somebody thinks they're doing their job, it's not filtering down.

Mr. Bridget: In this case, filtering out.

Mr. Brandgard: Yeah, I fully understand the issues we're having but I have to say, it's been working in my neighborhood.

Mr. Klinger: It's typically been hit or miss, right.

Mr. Angle: It is hit or miss. Like, my neighborhood has been clockwork where they did exactly what they said they'd do and they're picking it up, putting it down. I've even seen them get out of the truck when they drop stuff and put it in the truck. So, I think it's dependent upon the driver of the truck.

Mr. McPhail: They missed one street in my neighborhood on recycle, and they had to drive by it three times and they missed the whole street. And then they missed three on the main street, coming in and out. They had to drive by it three times and they drove by full containers. So, it's just frustrating.

Mr. Brandgard: Yeah

Mr. Bridget: Well, if you feel frustrated, I can speak for Al because I've been working with Al over time on this and Al's a trooper. He's dealt with frustration. He understands that he's dealing with Waste Management; we're not dealing with Ray's anymore, and things are different. We can argue that Ray spoiled us to death because he lived here but that doesn't make any difference. Al has dealt and has been making progress very, very slowly, and dealing with broken promises and frustrations at a level that is really hard to explain sitting here at this table. I understand your

frustration. I must say that in my neighborhood it's working fine. We did have our problems, but those problems did get corrected. So, I hear you loud and clear.

Mr. McPhail: Yeah, it's just frustrating. So, I told my constituents that I would report that tonight.

Mr. Klinger: Well, I'll just say – also speaking for Al – we're going to keep working on them constantly. We have regular weekly meetings with them. Al is staying on top of them, and we will keep doing so until we get the level of service that we expect to have around here.

Mr. McPhail: And well, another issue, we were told they were going to every other week on recycling – that's not been communicated. I think Al told me that they're going to continue to pick up both until they get (inaudible). I don't know how...

Mr. Brandgard: They're going to continue to pick up both for a while, yeah.

Mr. McPhail: Yeah, but general public doesn't know that.

Mr. Brandgard: Well, the general public doesn't know it's going to go from every week to every other week.

Mr. McPhail: Oh yeah, they do. They've been told that with some communication. And I know Stephanie tried to (inaudible).

Mr. Klinger: Yeah, we've asked them to delay on that because we don't want to introduce any more changes. We just want to get the current service working right.

Mr. McPhail: I do have one other item. Bill (inaudible) – you're well aware of Bill (inaudible) – but he called me this afternoon and he said he had gotten a call from a lady that apparently lived in the new subdivision where (inaudible) road is.

Mr. Brandgard: Bridlewood

Mr. McPhail: She told him there are semi's parking on (inaudible) Road, up to five at a time.

Mr. Brandgard: We all got that email, Saturday.

Mr. McPhail: Oh, well I didn't get that, so... But he asked me to report that. And they're using the parking lot at Value City Furniture, down by the bank, every night there's five or six parked in there.

Mr. Brandgard: Yeah

Mr. Klinger: Yeah, that information has been passed on to the patrolmen within the police department. So, they're monitoring that situation.

Mr. Brandgard: Yeah, they're monitoring both.
